

Bill to Award Credit to International Baccalaureate Degree (IB) Recipients

WHEREAS Truman currently only awards credit for higher level International Baccalaureate exams with a score of 4 or higher and doesn't consider the IB diploma in awarding credit;

WHEREAS The IB diploma is a demanding two-year curriculum overseen by a nonprofit educational organization based in Switzerland leading to final examinations designed by the organization and the awarding of a diploma. The organization provides the curriculum for each IB course of study. To earn a diploma, students

- Pursue six different subjects (literature, second language, individuals and societies, Experimental Sciences, Mathematics and computer science, and Arts) and take a higher or standard exam worth up to 7 diploma points each in each subject area.
- Study 3 subjects at the higher level (240 hours of instruction) and 3 at the standard level (150 hours of instruction)
- Students complete the Theory of Knowledge Course, a 4000-word extended essay, and 150 hours of service worth 1 diploma point each.
- Must earn a minimum of 24 points out of a possible 45 points.

The exams are scored on a scale of 1 to 7.

WHEREAS the number of high schools with IB programs are increasing across the state and the region;

WHEREAS students who have attended Truman and received credit for IB exams have done well at Truman;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT Truman will grant a minimum of 30 hours of credit to students earning an IB diploma with a diploma score of 30 or above. These students will receive elective hours for standard level exams that do not have Truman equivalencies and will continue to receive credit for specific Truman courses for their higher level exams. The Registrar will ask departments to evaluate standard level exams to see if we should establish Truman equivalencies.

RE: Recommended Changes to awarding Truman credit for students taking IB exams and earning IB diplomas

Current Truman Policy

Truman only awards credit for higher level exams (4 or higher) and doesn't consider the IB diploma in awarding credit.

Recommended Policy Change

Truman will grant a minimum of 30 hours of credit to students earning an IB diploma with a score of 30 or above. They would receive elective hours for standard level exams that do not have Truman equivalencies. Students would continue to receive credit for specific courses for their higher level exams. We would ask departments to evaluate the standard level exams to see if we should establish Truman equivalencies.

Rationale

IB programs are growing and produce excellent students. These students have done well at Truman and we'd like to see more of them. By awarding credit for the diploma, we will be more attractive to these students. We will effectively enable them to graduate Truman in 3 years if they so desire.

Background Information on the IB

How do other schools handle the IB diploma?

Looking at COPLAC and public schools in Missouri, Truman’s policy is not inconsistent. A few COPLAC schools (College of Charleston, Fort Lewis College, and Midwestern State University) award credit for standard level exams. Northwest, University of Central Missouri, Missouri State, and Southeast award credit for some standard level exams.

Drury and University of Minnesota, Morris both award credits for the IB diploma based on the IB diploma score. Based on state law, all public institutions in Colorado award a minimum of 24 college credits to IB diploma recipients.

How have Truman students with IB credit done?

During the last 10 years, we have granted credit to 180 students who submitted an IB transcript. We have not tracked whether these students received diplomas. On the whole these students have done well at Truman and persisted to graduation.
